Here at ARF of Bartlesville we believe that Senior Citizens should have pets and that Senior Pets should have owners. Our Senior Partner program strives to make this happen for both seniors over 65, dogs over 7, and cats over 10. Senior pets should not have to live out their twilight years in a kennel and senior citizens should not be deprived of having a furry companionship if at all possible.

Why is there a need for a Senior Partners Program?

• Research suggests that companion animals, such as cats and dogs, can help improve our physical and mental health. By adopting and spending time with an animal, you may experience the benefits of lowered stress levels. Pet owners also have been found to be sick less often.

• Cats and dogs provide friendship and opportunities for interacting with others which an older person may miss if family is far away or not around on a regular basis.

• The company of a beloved pet has been proven to reduce depression and help people deal with loss and grief.

• The quiet home of a senior citizen is the perfect match for an older animal looking for a new home and a less stressful environment.

• Senior animals are often a gentler, calmer companion and usually are already trained.

We try our hardest to reassure the Senior owner or family member that we will do our best to find a good home for their furry family member.



ARF Finding homes for Senior pets with Seniors

It is ofter terrifying and confusing to senior pets that, at no fault of their own they find themselves at a rescue or shelter. They often don't eat for days and are depressed. Here at ARF we try to make the transition as comfortable as possible. The pets spend a lot of time in our office, on people's laps, out on walks, or even car rides to Sonic for a cheeseburger. We also strive to find them a new home as quick as possible, hopefully with another loving Senior who is looking for a new companion.



Forever Foster Homes for Senior pets

When a senior animal has a guestimated lifespan of less then 1 year they may qualify for a Forever Foster Home. In a Forever Foster Home the senior animal has essentially been adopted, but ARF shares in some of the medical expenses for the remainder of their life.

Logan was dumped out in the country. He was taken in by a good samaritan. The temporary owners have an elderly blind shepherd and Logan's high energy antics were scaring their old dog, so they decided they couldn't keep him. Logan was kept in a stock trailer part of the time because he could jump their fence. His biggest downfall is that he does not like to be shut up in kennels or small spaces. He is approximately 10 months old so still very much a puppy. We think he is a cattle dog/Gordan Setter mix? He is really a unique dog when you see him in person. Short and stocky like a cattle dog, but thick wavy black hair.

Logan walks fantastic on a leash. He would be a great jogging or hiking buddy. He loves running and splashing in the creek at the ARF Park. He gets along good with other dogs. He hates going back in his kennel after playing. He needs a big yard with a 6ft fence.



We were told by the owner, that surrendered her to us, that Georgia has been to almost every shelter in the area. WCSPCA, Pawhuska, and Dewey animal control. She was originally surrendered to the WCSPCA by her first owner. Georgia escaped from the new owners that adopted her and ended up back at the shelter. The original owner payed the fee to claim her, but told them to call the second owner. She was then given to a relative and escaped again. Ended up at the Dewey shelter and so on. Here at ARF she has learned some manners, but mainly she is running off energy at the ARF Park everyday. She absolutely loves to be outside and to chase varmint scents.

Cleo and her brother Tiger, formerly Berry were originally found at the Nowata Pound. Back in 2011 the caregiver at the pound was not reliable and had not shown up for several days. The kittens were starving and had eaten their whiskers off. Cleo was born 10/22/10 and were rescued by ARF when she was about 8 weeks old. After being vetted she was brought into ARF and was adopted by Nancy on 2/19/11. She was returned in just a year when Nancy moved out of state and could not take Cleo with her. She was then adopted by Roger for his mother in August of 2012. She had a loving home, but was returned in April of 2018 when their loving owner went into assisted living that would not allow pets. She is all alone in an ARF cat room because she is having a hard time getting use to all of the other cats...again.

Our on site Spay/Neuter clinics have been filling up fast. The next clinic is June 23rd and then August 25th. You must register and prepay in cash to hold a spot.

Dog surgery includes rabies shot if needed

There may be added costs such as, if the females are in heat, already pregnant, or if other shots are requested.
